In the Road Map, we have also highlighted several events, programs, resources and tools that are of interest to medical students, residents and fellows:

- NextGen ID Lounge: Stop by and enjoy coffee, water and a safe environment to network and meet other trainees. The lounge is for medical students, residents and fellows coming to **ID**Week. It will feature sessions particularly useful for those in training and offers a place to network. Check out the schedule for the NextGen ID Lounge and come to the sessions that seem most interesting to you!
- Early Career Schedule: In the Road Map, we offer a brief overview of how IDWeek is structured as a meeting and answer the top questions about IDWeek.
- Career Fair: Don't miss the career fair Thursday, Oct. 17, 6 8 p.m. in the BugHub.
- Fellows' Day and Pediatric Fellows' Day: Come to one of the two premeeting workshops for fellows. Both sessions take place Wednesday, Oct. 16. The Fellows' Day Workshop is from 8 a.m. to 12:15 p.m., and the Pediatric Fellows' Day is from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m.
- Physician Compensation Initiative Sessions: Check out the program for the many physician compensation initiative activities.

**DWeek** is the joint annual meeting of the Infectious Diseases Society of America, the Society for Healthcare Epidemiology of America, the HIV Medicine Association, the Pediatric Infectious Diseases Society and the Society of Infectious Diseases Pharmacists. With more than 250 listed events and thousands of attendees, it can be a lot to navigate! Fortunately, **ID**Week has an <u>interactive program planner</u> that simplifies the process of finding and saving the sessions you want to attend.

The **ID**Week interactive planner allows you to navigate sessions in several ways. You can search by date/time – seeing only events happening that day – or seek out sessions based on speaker, topic, session type or the track based on the topic, and this includes a "Trainee Track." The full schedule can be searched by track, and you will also see this trainee label on sessions that are

relevant to the Trainee Track. Other sessions of interest can be sessions curated for a specific audience, such as adult ID providers or those interested in HIV/STIs. When you find sessions you want to attend, you can save these into a personal schedule, helping you stay organized as you navigate the events. Before leaving for **ID**Week, make sure to download the event app, which will allow you to take your saved schedule on the go.

While at **ID**Week, make sure to take in extra opportunities for networking. One place to check out is the NextGen ID Lounge, an area dedicated to trainees and medical students. This is a place to recharge – both your electronics and coffee cups – and meet other trainees. Throughout the week, there will also be expert-led educational sessions.

# **ID**WEEK **PREMEETING WORKSHOPS**

### **PW01 – Vincent T. Andriole ID Board Review** Course

Oct. 15, 8 a.m. – 5:30 p.m. Room 515A

This workshop is designed for infectious diseases physicians preparing for the board exam or seeking a general update and review. Topics that will be addressed include the following: parasitic infections, vaccines, HIV, rickettsial diseases, STIs, infection control and prevention and transplant infections. The participants will have an opportunity to utilize an audience response system to answer case-based microbiologic and clinical ID questions.

### PW04 – Fellows' Day Workshop

Oct. 16, 8 a.m. – 12:15 p.m. Room 403A

This workshop is designed for infectious diseases fellows. The two topics are:

- 1. Infectious Disease Case Presentations: This popular interactive session features cases presented by fellows with faculty discussants.
- 2. Careers in Infectious Diseases: There will be a session on compensation and contract negotiation as well as interactive small group sessions devoted to exploring

different ID careers. Each session will be led by a person who has made their career in a different area of infectious diseases.

### PW05 – Pediatric Fellows' Day

Oct. 16, 8 a.m. – 1 p.m. Room 408B

This workshop is designed for pediatric fellows and academicians who wish to understand issues related to the effective transitioning from fellowship to faculty positions, explore various career paths in pediatric infectious diseases and identify common and uncommon infections in children.



#### **Opening Plenary – Navigating the Next Pandemic: Policy and Practice Integration** *Oct. 16, 3:45 – 5:30 p.m.* **Ballroom (West Hall B)**

Kick off your **ID**Week sessions with this candid dialogue highlighting the importance of policy and practice preparation in anticipation of future pandemics. ID leaders Jennifer Nuzzo, DrPH, of the Brown University School of Public Health; Nicole Lurie, MD, MSPH, from the Coalition for Epidemic Preparedness Initiatives; and Paul Friedrichs, MD, of the White House Office of Pandemic Preparedness and Response Policy will present, followed by a panel discussion.



# **IDWEEK EARLY CAREER ATTENDEE TIPS**

- PLAN AHEAD! Check out the IDWeek program before your trip and map out the sessions that catch your attention and ID interests.
- Avoid frequent switching between conference rooms mid-session, as this has the potential to decrease your learning and can create unnecessary stress!
- IDWeek is the perfect opportunity to search out job opportunities:
  - Be proactive and reach out to potential employers before **ID**Week to ask if they are going and whether they could meet to discuss potential opportunities. Be sure to attach your CV to all communications.
  - During IDWeek, ask your mentors to introduce you to people at desired institutions to help establish the initial connection.
  - Finally, make sure to attend the roundtable career \_ discussions during Fellows' Day to get a sense of what career path opportunities are available.
- Networking is an essential part of attending the conference. Here are some tips to navigate the sea of new connections during IDWeek:
  - Be open to all opportunities: Collaborations involving junior trainees and faculty have the potential to be longer-lasting, inclusive and rewarding. That's how the new generation of ID leaders is built!

- Be bold: Find a way to say hello! And if you need help, ask a friend or mentor to initiate the introduction.
- Ask questions: Ask pointed and thoughtful questions of the person you want to get to know. That will probably be more memorable than you verbally delivering your impressive CV.
- Keep it brief: IDWeek is a huge and busy time for everyone. So, be bold, say hello, ask questions, tell them who you are and what you do, but keep the conversation short.
- Follow up: See if you can follow it up via an email or another meeting, either in person or virtually. But, if it doesn't go great, try not to take it too personally.
- Don't forget to leave some time to enjoy the city of Los Angeles. There is so much to do in this beautiful city.
